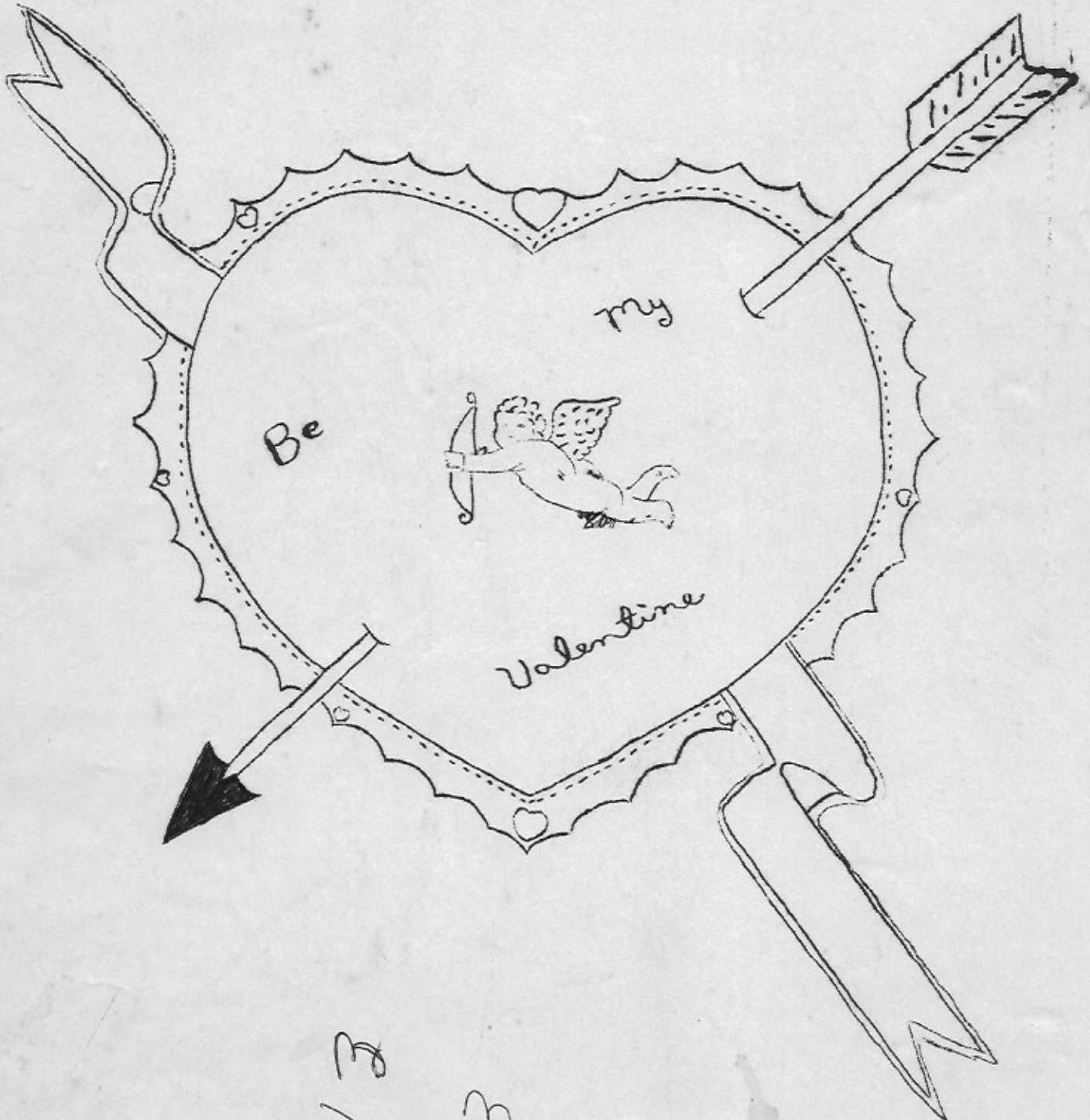

HAPPY VALENTINES DAY

At some time during our lives all of us will have to choose a vocation. The first and most important reason why most people have to have a vocation is to earn a living. Even if a man were not obligated to earn a living, he would still work for he is an active creature. He can't sit still. He must be doing something all the time. In the long process of development, he has invented things to do which we call occupations. Without them we would be miserable. Instances show that people are unhappy without work. One good example is that in prisons the sanity of the prisoners demands that they be given something to do. Make brooms, s hoes, anything to keep the mind and body active.

Most wealthy men manage to take up some activity even if he does not have to. It may be collecting stamps, playing polo, or even establishing orphanages. No matter what it is, most men and women of means fill their days with regular activities of some sort.

Another reason why people work is to solve their human needs, houses food or clothing. In order to get these they must produce or have someone else produce them.

As the population increases man's wants are becoming more numerous. If a person wanted something that he could not produce, it had to be imported. So men became sailors, merchants and importers. Choosing a vocation depends on the individual's physical and mental capacities. Some people are very strong physically and can do heavy work, while others are exceptionally intelligent and can more appropriately serve as a judge. It is most sensible that each occupation be manned by a person who can easily fit into it.

Many people never choose a vocation, but they merely drift. They hold a succession of jobs. Here one day and there the next. Such persons are frequently out of employment. They earn low wages and derive little happiness from their work.

Then there are people who choose unwisely. They enter a job not interesting and do not succeed. As a result, they are unhappy and unsatisfied.

In choosing a vocation you can adopt this rule. In choosing a vocation I will use judgement. I will not drift. I will not jump into something without investigating it first.

Get a general view of the occupational world. Study the number and variety of occupations in it. When considering a possible occupation, study it thoroughly. Study the conditions under which you would work, the requirements you would have to meet, and the rewards you might obtain. Study yourself and your qualifications. Find your strong points and weak points.

Then compare your qualifications. If it is suitable, take it, if not go somewhere else. Even after you follow this procedure, you may get the wrong vocation, but it will increase your chances of success and happiness.

According to the Bureau of Census of 1950 about 8.9% are employed in professional and technical work. These are the lawyers, dentists and physicians.

The largest group of workers consist of the "Operatives." They make up about 19.8% of the employed. They work chiefly in manufacturing plants where they run machines.

The next of the largest number of workers is made up of draftsmen, foremen and kindred workers. They make up about 13.7%. These are the plumbers, bricklayers and mechanics. Farm workers make up about 12.5%, the clerical workers about 12.1%.

Most young people should have already chosen their vocation or they should choose very shortly.

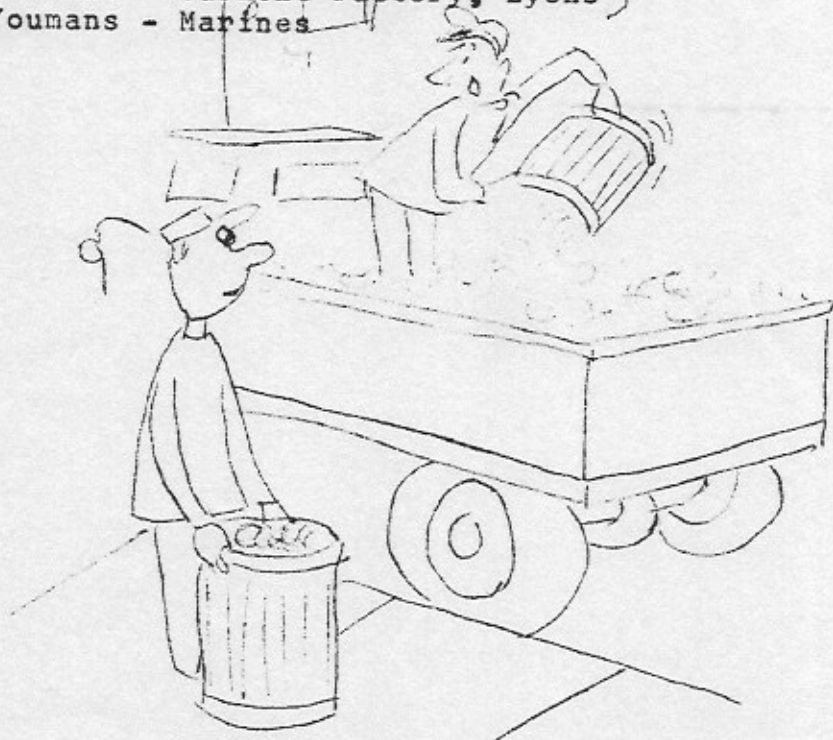
