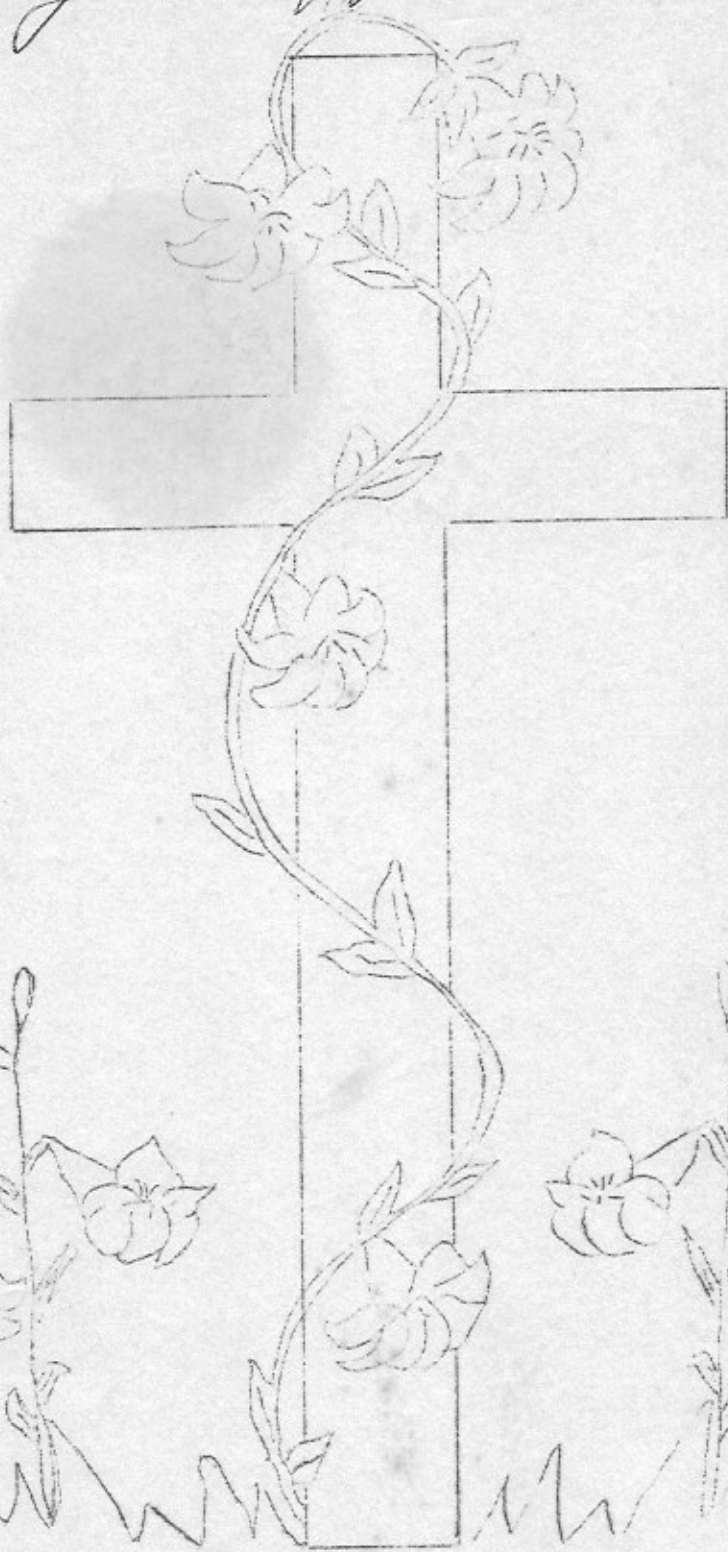

## EASTER

Easter is a Christian festival that celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is the most important Holy day of the Christian religion.

On Easter Sunday, people attend churches and take part in religious ceremonies.

The story of Easter comes from the Bible. The Gospels tell that the body of Jesus disappeared from His tomb on the third day after His crucifixion. An angel appeared to His followers and announced, "He is risen."

Christians everywhere celebrate Easter with great rejoicing. In many areas, children collect candy and chocolate bunnies, and hunt colorful Easter eggs. Many persons wear new spring clothes to church on Easter.

Some symbols of Easter are the cross, which represents the crucifixion of Jesus Christ; the lamb as a symbol of Jesus, and eggs which represent the new life that returns to nature about Easter time.

Christians in many parts of the world celebrate before the Easter season with carnivals and masquerades and feasts. These celebrations reach a peak of gaiety on Shrove Tuesday more than six weeks before Easter. On Ash Wednesday, the day after Shrove Tuesday, many Christians start a solemn forty-day period of fast and prayer called Lent. It recalls Christ's forty-day fast in the wilderness.

The last week of Lent, called Holy Week, honors the events of the last week of Christ's life on earth. It begins on Palm Sunday, named for the palms that people spread before Jesus as he entered Jerusalem in triumph. On the Thursday of the last week of Lent, Maundy Thursday, Christians recall Jesus' last supper and the time He washed the feet of His disciples. They observe Good Friday, the day of the crucifixion, in a somber manner and spend Holy Saturday in anticipation. On Easter Sunday, millions of Christians in all parts of the world unite in their feelings of joy in the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The crucifixion seemed a dark day in the history of man but, the resurrection brought promise of a new life to come for all men.

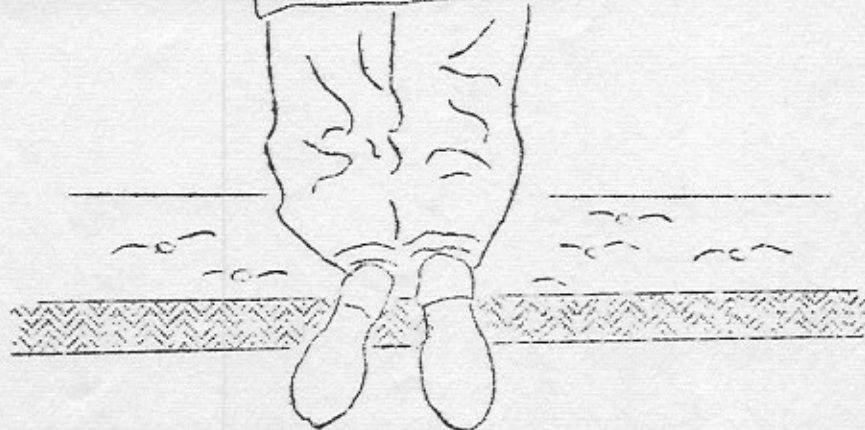
It happened on an April day,

Christ rose upon an April day!





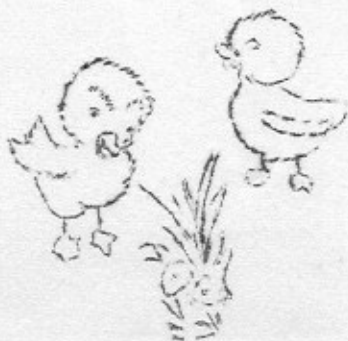

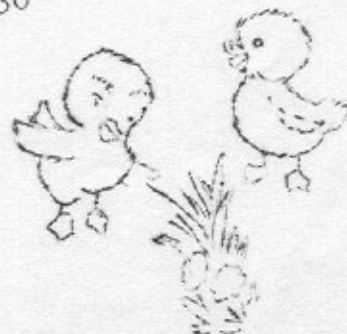
