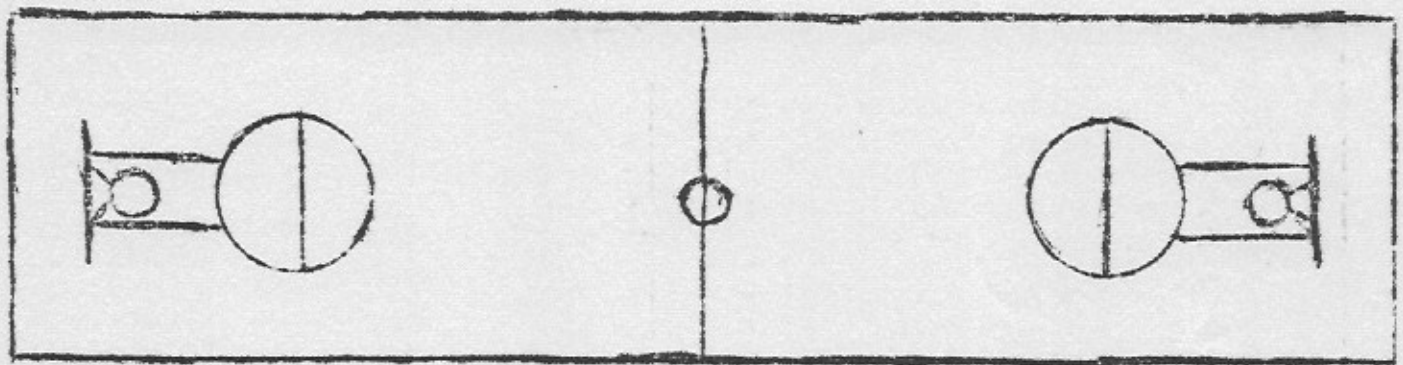

## LYONS WINS FIRST REGION

GAME BY DEFEATING METTER 32 TO 6

Metter kicked off to Lyons and Raymond Landrum receiving the ball almost made a touchdown, but he was knocked out of bounds on the 1 yard line. On the next play Landrum scored. The try for the extra point failed, and Lyons led 6 to 0.

Alexander on a keep play went around his own right-end for the second score. The point was good, and Lyons led 13 to 0 going into the 2nd quarter.

The Bulldogs recovered a Metter fumble on the 2 yard line and on the next play Barry Jones slashed across right tackle standing up for the score. The extra point failed.

Metter developed an offensive drive and was forced to punt all night. The Bulldogs moved into Metter territory again and Raymond scored his second touchdown of the evening. Landrum was injured right before the half, and was removed from the game. The score at half time was 25 to 0 in favor of Lyons.

The second half was dominated by Metter which finally made its first score of the season. Lyons scored once in the second half on a pass from Alexander to George Fant. The final score, Lyons 32, Metter 6.

This victorious game was costly for Lyons, however; Ray Moody received a broken collar bone, R. T. Stanley a broken nose, and Raymond Landrum was knocked unconscious.
