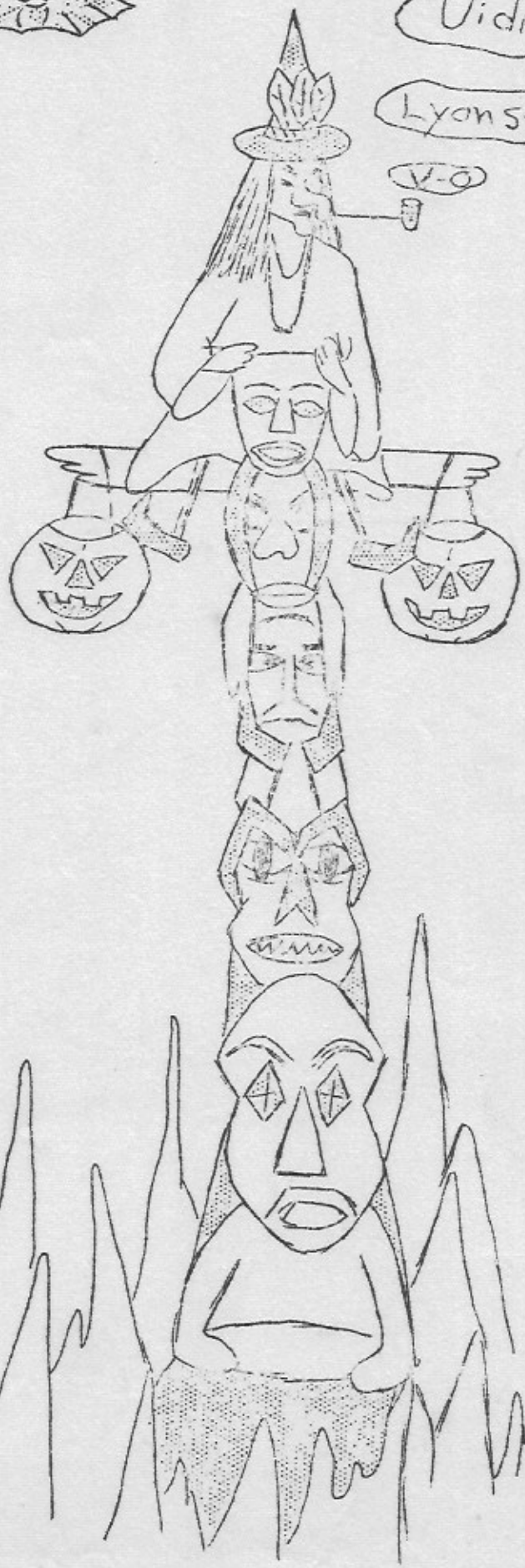

As the leaves begin to become colorful and the weather introduces its chilly nights, Mother Nature is hard at work changing the seasons. Once more it is time for ghosts and goblins to re-visit and stir the festivities of our annually celebrated holiday, Halloween.

Customs and superstitions gathered through the ages go into our celebration of Halloween or "Holy Eve" on October 31. The day is so named because it is the eve of the festival of All Saints, but many of the beliefs and observances connected with it rose long before the Christian Era, in the autumn festivals of the pagan peoples.

The ancient Druids celebrated for three days at the beginning of November. On the eve before they believed spirits of the dead roamed abroad, thus they lighted bonfire fires to drive them away. In ancient Rome the festivals of Pomona goddess of fruits and gardens, occurred at about this time of year. It was an occasion of rejoicing associated with the harvest; and nuts and apples, as symbols of the winter store of fruits were roasted before huge bonfire fires.

Even after November first became a Christian feast day, honoring all saints, the peasants clung to the old pagan beliefs and customs that had grown up about Halloween. It became a night of mystery and fun-making, with many picturesque superstitions. Folk began to believe that they could foretell the future on that night by performing rites as jumping over lighted candles. In the British Isles great bonfires blazed as laughing bands of "guisers," young people disguised in grotesque masks, carried lanterns carved from turnips.

Our Halloween celebrations today keep many of these early customs unchanged. Young and old still gather to hunt nuts and to dunk for apples bobbing in a tub of water. Grinning pumpkins, known as jack-o-lanterns, rustling corn-stalks and white-sheeted figures create an air of mystery and black witches and cats are used for decorations.

F.H.A. ENCOURAGES FURTHERING OUR EDUCATION

If I were asked for my opinion by anyone quitting school, I would tell him he is making one of the worst mistakes of his life. If a person is happy in school, she should never quit to get a job or to get married. Marriage is something that will wait until after school is finished. It will give her time to find out if it's really what she wants and it will give her time to grow up more and to take responsibility more seriously.

The greatest single reason given by girls who left school was marriage. However, other important factors were lack of interest in school and classwork, not knowing how to study, and pressure from parents and school personnel to take specific courses. These were the reasons given by some girls that left school.

Chapter projects suggested by the F.H.A. members to curb the dropout problem included:

- 1- Arranging programs to be addressed by representatives from employment agencies, by marriage counselors, by personnel directors and by dropouts who wish they hadn't.
- 2- Preparing handouts such as, NOW HEAR YOUTH ON WHAT HAPPENS TO THE DROPOUTS.
- 3- Organizing a youth counseling service with the aid of trained counselors.
- 4- Organized efforts by FHA chapters to hold functions for potential and actual dropouts.
- 5- Making special efforts to help potential dropouts feel wanted and befriended.
