THE TRIUMPH OF LIFE

Easter is the supreme religious festival of the year for all adherents of the Christian faith. At the same time it is intimately connected, in origin and place in the calendar, with the long non-Christian history of the Mediterranean and North European races. The Crucifixion took place, as the biblical narratives tell us, on the day of the Jewish Passover. The name under which Easter is known in the Romanic languages is derived, through the Greek, from the Hebrew word for Passover. Behind this link are many traditions and observances which show that men's imaginations were caught, centuries before the Christian era, by the mood expressed in Solomon's words:

For lo, the Winter is past,
The rain is over and gone;
The flowers appear on the earth;
The time of the singing of birds is come.

Men of all faiths and all philosophies can read in the rhapsodies of Hebrew shepherds and prophets, tending their sheep or making their journeys over the hills of Palestine under million-starred night skies, in the teachings and sufferings of the great Prophet of Christianity and the lesser saints and prophets, the origin of that spiritual quality which, with the Greek intellect, was to create the modern world. When that spirituality-ripening through the ages into freedom for the human mind and soul-is threatened, the Christian churches will find allies in many a diverse creed and many an individual who lapsed from formal religion.

This Easter we know that the hand of death is on civilization in many parts of the world. An unseasonable kind of Winter hangs over them, even though seeds are germinating in

the ground, grass growing green, fruit trees putting out blossoms. But it is not easy, nor fitting, to be hopeless in springtime, nor, above all, on Easter Sunday. Death in times past has been called by many names, for which its new ones, doctrinal and political, are only synonyms. The secular as well as the religious lesson of Easter is that death has never won a lasting victory.
