Like many seasonal festive occasions, Easter has come to be an important social as well as a religious occasion. Easter is one of the claest and most universal of all Christian holidays. Behind it his stories of human hope and a belief in a life after our physical death. The essence of all religious - Whether Christian, non-Christian, or "pagan" - is belief in a supreme power that has control of life and death.

And what could be more natural? "Hope springs eternal in the human breast." The Easter season is the season of hope. It is then that human beings see physical evidence of a continuation of life which all men-whether they believe in a life after death or not-hope will be true in their case.

Like most holidays, it is of great interest for children. However, the real significance and beauty of the occasion can be fully appreciated only by more mature minds. Easter has come to be almost synonymous with "Resurrection." The Easter celebration is universal in all Christian lands, and is hold to commemorate the resurrection of Jesus, after He had been crucified and had lain in the tomb for three days.

As in the case with most of our festive days, many unique customs and superstitions have grown up around Easter. The most common and interesting of these is the Easter egg and the Easter rabbit. Whatever the source of the custom, Easter-eggs are an inseparable part of our modern Easter celebration.

Being primarily a religious festival, of course the Easter services in the churches are most outstanding of Easter activities. The habit of wearing new clothes on Easter Sunday originated as a duty rather than a luxury. It was a symbol of new life in uature to have on new clothes for the Easter festivities. Nature was putting on a new dress-men and women should do likewise.

These and many other customs and superstitions accompany the Easter season. And although many of them may be wholly legendary, they are here to remind us that the occasion has come to mean a great deal to Shristian peoples all over the world.

(5) To develop fundamental basic skills that will help each child obtain his highest provide potentialities. (6) To a functional program of health education.

WOODS SCHOLARSHIP OFFERED IN COUNTY
