For those who think of school as a place of practical jokes and foolishness, there is no joy for the future. They think only of a gay time now, with no work.

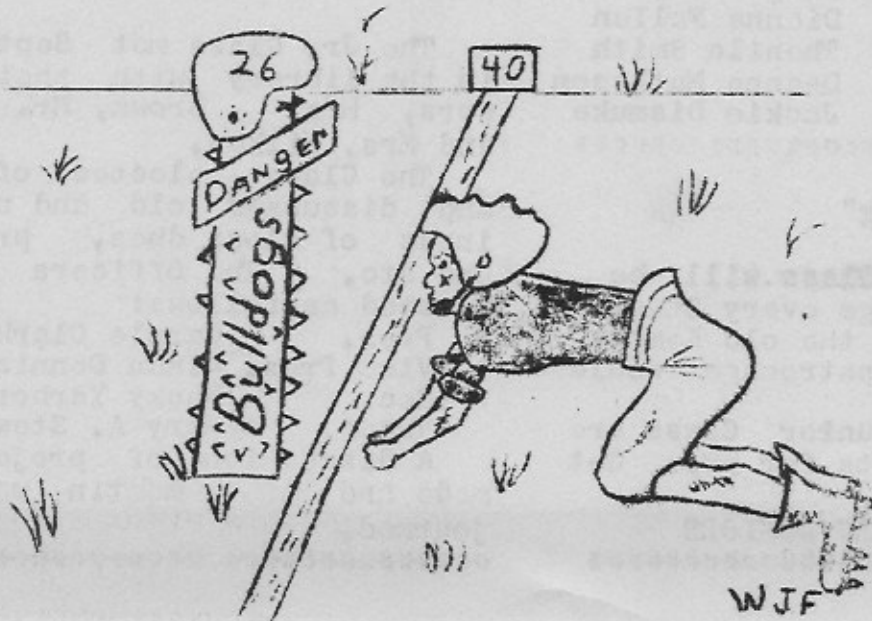
For those with the "I don't care" attitude there's no love-love for knowledge, art, or education.

LYONS TIES SWAINSBORO

The Lyons High Bulldogs opened their 1958 football season here Friday night by tying Class A Swainsboro 6-6.

Lyons scored in the second quarter when half-back Barry Jones capped a 49-yard march by diving over the 1-yard line. The try for extra point failed.

Swainsboro came back to tie the score in the third quarter.

The Tigers marched 70 yards after taking the second half kick - off and scored when quarterback Wayne Harrel plunged over from the 2-yard line.

The try for extra point failed when the pass from center was bad. All-state end Herman Wilkes attempted to run with the ball but was stopped.

The Lyons High offense was led by quarterback Fred Brogdon's passing and the hard running of Robert McDilda. Jimmy Collins intercepted one enemy pass and made a 8-yard run from his left halfback post. Barry Jones scored the Lyons touchdown and played a good game throughout.

The Lyons line was anchored by ends Jerry Scott and Ray Moody, who played an outstanding defensive game. Hubert Sowell, Rhett Smith, Hayward Thompson, George Youngblood, Phil Phillips, and Virgil Odom all played

well for Lyons in the interior line. R. T. Stanley was a main cog on defense before being injured in the second quarter.

Inexperience and lack of depth seem to be the Bulldogs' main trouble but they have good spirit and promise to improve as the season progresses

Lyons Tops Claxton by 31-20

The Lyons Bulldogs spoiled Claxton's home debut there Friday night with a 31-20 victory in a hard--fought contest.

Lyons held a slender 19-13 lead at half time but scored 12 points in the final half while holding the Tigers to a single marker.

It was a region 2-B contest. Robert McDilda started Lyons off when he dashed over from the 10-yard line in the first quarter. Frank Wright added the PAT.

Claxton bounced back with a Parker to waters pass good for a 5 -yard scoring play. Powell ran over for the extra point.

Lyons tallied twice in the second quarter, once when halfback Barry Jones intercepted a pass and dashed 60 yards and again when halfback Jimmy Collins took a pass from Fred Brogdon good for a 55 yard touchdown.

Powell scored for Claxton in the second quarter from the 3-yard line.

Lyons scored again in the third quarter when McDilda went over from the 11 and added the final marker in the last period when Barry Jones scored from the six.

Powell gave Claxton its final marker with a 21-yard run in the last quarter.

Lyons was again led by the hard running of McDilda, Collins, and Jones; and the fine ball handling and passing of Fred Brogdon.

Clearing the way up front was the hard fighting Lyons line.
