# DO YOU KNOW HOW TO STUDY?

The hours have flown by so quickly and suddenly we find that another 9 months of school has rolle around. Time to get to the old grind and forget the summer's fun. Ugh. For most of us, it's going to be hard to concentrate on that dull old physics, or grammar, or health. However, if we follow a few simple suggestions for study, perhaps we shall find it not so hard, after all.

Good study habits are quite as important as subject matter. The student's aim should be to do the job in less time and todo it better.

1. Form a time and place babit by studying the lesson in the same subject in the same place at the same time each day. Don't study immediately after a hearty meal.

2. Have proper study conditions and equipment, a quite room, not too warm, good light at the left, a straight chair and table, the nec-

essary books, tools, and materials close at hand.

3. Study independently. Do your own work and use your own judgment, asking for help only when you cannot proceed without it, thus developing the ability to think for yourself and the will power and self-reliance essential to success.

4. Arrange your tasks economically; study those subjects requiring fresh attention first, and those in which concentration is easier, like

written work, later.

- 5. Sit straight and go at the work vegorously with confidence and determination, without lounging or waste of time. When actually tired, exercise a moment. Open the win ow and change to a different type of work.
- 6. Learn to form your own judgments, to work out your own problems Your teacher is not in the room to do your lessons for you, but merely to give you a few su gestions.

7. Talk to your parents about your school work. Discuss with


them points that interest you.

8. Do all the studying you can in school hours. You have supervised study then. On't waste your time. 9. Connect the important facts of each new lesson with facts prev ously learne !.

10. Be sure you understand the assignment and the form in which it is to be delivered. Take notes in class when assignment is made. Mark things to be carefully learned. When indoubt consult the teacher.

11. Use judgment as well as memory; analyze paragraphs; select important points and note how many are related. Use your pencil freely to mark important points so that you learn systematically.

By keeping up these study habits throughout the year, we shouldn't have to worry about cramming for exams.
